Dear Senator Stabenow, Senator Collins, Representative Smith, and Representative Tonko:

On behalf of the undersigned organizations, thank you for your leadership on issues important to all Americans with dementia, including those with Alzheimer's disease. We proudly support your legislation, the *Health Outcomes*, *Planning*, *and Education* (*HOPE*) *for Alzheimer's Act* (*S.* 857/H.R. 1559) as a critical step forward in improving care for people with dementia.

Absent a medical treatment that will prevent, cure, or stop the progression of dementia, we must inform and support families after a diagnosis to maintain quality of life, improve outcomes, and control costs. Unfortunately, many individuals diagnosed with dementia are never given the opportunity to fully discuss the diagnosis, their options for treatment and support, or develop a comprehensive care plan. The *HOPE for Alzheimer's Act* builds on existing Medicare coverage to provide beneficiaries diagnosed with dementia and their caregivers with comprehensive care planning services, including:

- Information about the diagnosis and what it means for the beneficiary and their family;
- Review of medical and non-medical options for treatment, services, and supports;
- Development of an initial, comprehensive care plan that addresses any other conditions the beneficiary may have; and
- Documentation of the diagnosis and care plan in the beneficiary's medical record.

The latest version of the HOPE for Alzheimer's Act also maintains critical elements that would allow for the care planning services to be received by a beneficiary's caregiver(s) or personal representative(s), with or without the patient present. Such consultations are often needed to ensure appropriate care planning services are understood and received by the newly-diagnosed. This also assists practitioners by allowing for a more-efficient delivery of information and care planning services for the newly-diagnosed.

We commend you for your leadership and commitment to helping those with dementia, as well as their families and caregivers and look forward to working with you to achieve enactment of the *HOPE for Alzheimer's Act (S. 857/H.R. 1559)* this Congress.
